Green Print 2020 - What we can do.

No-one made a greater mistake than he who did nothing because he could do so little Edmund Burke

The climate scientists agree that we have a short time to avert climate catastrophe – about five to 10 years to start to implement changes. Developing a model which would demonstrate what a low carbon economy and life-style would look like is urgently needed.

We need to cut CO₂ emissions by 80% before 2030. That requires massive societal and economic changes and expectations. It is the rich world which is causing most of the damage: 20% of the world's population consumes 80% of the world's resources and it is those who have caused little damage who are already suffering.

The single most effective thing you can do is to lobby your Member of Parliament and other influential bodies, including commercial companies: they must be convinced that there are votes and support in taking action to avert catastrophe. Change should present opportunities, not threats.

Lobbying, Getting Connected and Informed.

We are facing an extremely difficult and, what appears to be, an unpalatable situation:

If climate catastrophe is to be averted, who needs to do what, by when, and what, being realistic, might motivate them? It is important not to feel isolated and powerless.

We should all become advocates for a low carbon world. We must lead by example.

Poverty is exacerbated by the threat of climate change: it is already affecting the poorest. Some parts of the world will become uninhabitable and those living in such areas will need to move to more temperate areas.

All life is threatened by climate catastrophe. And extinction of species is already happening.

Actions:

- Do all you can to influence organisations with which you interact, including those that employ you and any voluntary organisations with which you are involved.

Write to your MP to exhort her/him to push for carbon rationing or any other of the climate emergency solutions: MPs have to take notice of their constituents, and a heavy postbag on one issue will really make a difference and will challenge their belief that 'there are no votes in environmental issues' – recently this seems to be changing. Respond to Government consultations adding your weight to demands for decarbonisation and protection against air, sea and land pollution. Up until 15th July 2020 BEIS has launched a Post-Pandemic Economic Growth super-inquiry on "the options available to Government to secure our economic recovery from the impact of Covid-19; covering investment, industrial strategy, jobs, skills, exports and sustainable growth." https://committee/news/146725/postpandemic-economic-growth-superinquiry-launched-by-beis-committee/
